Goals	Fractions as numbers: Understand fractions and decimals as numbers that can be located on the number line, compared, counted, partitioned, and decomposed. Rational numbers can be written in fraction form or decimal form and can be represented as points or distances on a number line. The absolute value of a number is its distance from 0 on the number line. A number-line representation is useful for ordering and comparing rational numbers. Benchmarks are useful for estimating values of fractions and decimals.	 Ratios as comparisons: Understand ratios as comparisons of two quantities. Ratios are comparisons between two numbers. You can scale ratios to make equivalent ratios. Percents are ratios where 100 parts represent the whole. A rate is a particular kind of ratio, where the amounts compared are in different units. A unit rate is a ratio in which one of the quantities being compared has a value of 1. 	Equivalence: Understand equivalence of fractions and ratios, and use equivalence to solve problems. • Fractions and decimals can be renamed or repartitioned to find equivalent fractions or decimals. Equivalence is useful for moving between fraction and decimal representations and for solving problems. Equivalent ratios represent the same relationship between quantities.
